Course Description

Contemporary World is a course now required by the new Quebec Education Program for Cycle 2 Year 3 (grade 11).

The educational aims of this course are to help students understand the nature of the relationships that form among societies and the way in which these relationships shape the organization of the world today. Students will be encouraged to become aware of their role in society and of their responsibilities as citizens. The program will help students to become critically aware and open to diversity and to bring them into contact with a range of viewpoints regarding environment, population, power, wealth, tensions and conflicts. Throughout the year, students will be expected to critically assess themselves.

Course Objectives

In addition to introductory facts, this course will focus on three themes:

- Unit 0: Introduction (world geography, political ideologies, macroeconomics)
- Unit 2: Population and migration
- Unit 4: Disparity (inequality or differences) of wealth
- Unit 5: Intervention in zones of tension and conflict

Although no longer prescribed by the Basic School Regulations, this course will attempt to develop the following two competencies.

Competency 1, Interpretation: Interprets a contemporary world problem

Students will define and analyze specific issues, find answers to questions, explain and make sense of them.

Competency 2, Position: Takes a position on a contemporary world issue

Students will examine some points of view on specific issues, consider the media treatment of these issues, debate the issues and consider opportunities for social action.
